SUBJECT: KINSHIP/FOSTER CARE EMERGENCY FUND ALLOCATION FOR

FISCAL YEAR (FY) 2006/2007

REFERENCE: SUPERSEDES ALL COUNTY LETTER 05-22

This letter is to provide counties with information regarding the allocation of funding of the Kinship/Foster Care Emergency Fund. The FY 2006/07 Budget Act contains a \$1,000,000 State General Fund (SGF) appropriation to this fund. The per-county allocation listed in Attachment A is provided at this time to aid counties in planning their funding related to this allocation.

BACKGROUND

The purpose of the Kinship/Foster Care Emergency Fund is to enable successful emergency placement of a child with a relative, nonrelative extended family member (NREFM), or foster parent by removing barriers to such a placement. The fund may also be used to retain a placement when extenuating circumstances may alter the stability of the placement. Additionally, funds may be used to assist a prospective NREFM or foster family home applicant in meeting the requirements to provide care to a child.

Policy clarification of Section 1356.60 of the Code of Federal Regulations indicates that costs for items that are needed in order to license or approve a foster family home are closely related to foster family home recruitment and are allowable Title IV-E administrative costs. As such, allowable costs claimed to the Kinship/Foster Care Emergency Fund are eligible for federal financial participation as a Title IV-E administrative cost. Therefore, the \$1,000,000 SGF will be used to match Title IV-E funds, which results in a total of \$1.6 million being made available to counties for this program in FY 2006/07.

Examples of the types of costs for which a county may use the Kinship/Foster Care Emergency Fund allocation are costs that:

- Remove barriers that prevent the safe placement of a child (e.g., fire or water safety hazards, medication storage, electrical repair, or inadequate living space).
- Defray relocation expenses when necessary to ensure the child's safety orto provide adequate living space.

- Meet a child's special needs when those needs cannot be met through other funding sources (e.g., Specialized Care Incentives and Assistance Program (SCIAP)).
- Make emergency purchase of a major appliance or furniture when necessary to serve the placement of a child.
- Defray utility installation fees.
- Provide temporary childcare to permit adjustment of job and/or home schedules when an emergency placement is made.

All expenditures of this funding are to be for one-time needs and not to pay for recurring expenses. (Note: Social services such as short-term counseling previously claimed under this fund are not an allowable Title IV-E cost and as such, may not be claimed to this fund.) A county may serve a relative caregiver, NREFM, or prospective foster parent requiring one-time emergency assistance for expenses not covered by other funding sources, such as SCIAP or clothing allowance.

ALLOCATION METHODOLOGY AND AMOUNT

The per-county allocation was calculated using the most recent Child Welfare Services/Case Management System (CWS/CMS) relative placement data (February, 2006). Depending on the number of counties receiving funds from the FY 2006/2007 appropriation, there may be a surplus of funds that will be allocated to augment the proposed funding level for each county. Claiming instructions for FY 06/07 have been issued in County Fiscal Letter (CFL) 05/06-54, available at: www.dss.cahwnet.gov/lettersnotices/CountyFisc_544.htm.

Funds will be allocated through the county allocation process. The \$1.6 million total funds are proposed to be allocated to a participating county as follows:

•	500 or more children in relative placements	\$48,396
•	100 or more but less than 500 children in relative placements	\$16,132
•	Less than 100 children in relative placements	\$5,000

HOW TO RECEIVE AN ALLOCATION

Counties that received an allocation of the FY 2005/2006 appropriation will receive an allocation for FY 2006/2007. A letter of non-participation is required from any county that received an allocation from the fund in FY 2005/2006 but does not want to receive an allocation from the fund for FY 2006/2007.
