#### **Summary of Highlights**

This publication describes aggregate adoption activities and statistics for the State Fiscal Year (SFY) 1998-99 for Agency Adoptions, Independent Adoptions, and Intercountry Adoptions.

#### **Agency Adoptions:**

- 13,361 children were Accepted for Study as potential adoptees
- 8,963 children were *Legally Freed* for adoption
- 6,657 children were *Placed* in prospective adoptive homes
- 5,902 adoptions were Finalized
- 8,471 new families *Applied* to adopt children
- 5,939 families were *Approved* to adopt children
- 341 California children were adopted in other states in Cooperative Placements
- 200 children from other states were adopted in California

#### **Independent Adoptions:**

- 1,598 new Petitions to Adopt were received
- 1,225 Court Approvals to Adopt were recommended

#### **Intercountry Adoptions:**

- 410 new children from other countries were placed in California homes
- 616 children from other countries were adopted in California

#### **Description of Adoption Programs**

California supports five separate adoption programs. This publication presents summary data on three of those five adoption programs, as described in detail below. CDSS does not collect statistical data on the other two adoption programs, stepparent and adult adoptions. In **stepparent adoptions**, the court may be petitioned to allow the child of a spouse to be adopted by the stepparent. Both the parent retaining custody and the parent relinquishing custody must consent to the adoption. In **adult adoptions**, an adult may adopt another adult younger than himself/herself, if the superior court in the county in which either lives agrees. The three adoption programs described by this publication are:

Agency (Relinquishment) Adoption – An Agency (Relinquishment) Adoption is one in which children are placed for adoption by a licensed public or private adoption agency. The child to be adopted may have been relinquished by his or her birth parent(s) or, due to abuse or neglect, the parents' rights may have been terminated by court action. "Relinquishment" refers to a legal document signed by a parent and the adoption agency that has agreed to accept the child for adoptive placement. The relinquishment or court action terminates parental responsibility for the care and custody of the child and transfers this responsibility to the adoption agency. The child is then placed with a family suitable to meet the needs of the child.

Persons who wish to adopt a child may contact a licensed public or private adoption agency and submit an application to adopt. When it is accepted, the agency conducts a study of the family, including an evaluation of the kind of child the family can accept. Adoptive placement through relinquishment of a child to a licensed adoption agency provides certain advantages for both the birth and adopting parent(s). Such advantages include studies by adoption workers to determine the needs of the child and the attributes of the adopting parents before a child is placed. They also include the continuing availability of agency services throughout the adoption process.

In most cases, the agency responsible for the child is the same agency that has studied the family with whom the child is placed for adoption. However, in some cases, a child who is the responsibility of one agency is placed for adoption with a family studied by another agency. Such placements, which may involve agencies either in California or in other states, are referred to as "cooperative placements."

- Independent Adoption An Independent Adoption is one in which one or both of the birth parent(s) select the adoptive family and place the child, usually by signing a formal Independent Adoption Placement Agreement, with the adopting family. Parents who are not required by law to sign a placement agreement must formally consent to the adoption in writing before the adoption can be granted. After the child is placed for adoption, the adopting parents file a petition to adopt with the court. CDSS or a delegated county adoption agency then conducts a study of the prospective adoptive parents to determine their suitability as adoptive parents and of the child to determine if he or she is a proper subject for adoption. The child's birth parent continues to be the child's legal parent until the court approval of the adoption. The department or county adoption agency reports the findings of the study to the court and recommends that the petition be granted or denied.
- □ Intercountry Adoption The Intercountry Adoption Program enables a California resident(s) to adopt eligible foreign-born children through California adoption agencies licensed to provide intercountry adoption services. The adoption is either completed in California or completed abroad in the child's native country under the laws of the foreign county. Federal law makes special immigration visas available for such children.

The parent(s) who adopts a foreign-born child in California, and the parent(s) who plans to adopt a foreign-born child abroad, is required to have a home study conducted by a California private adoption agency licensed by CDSS to specifically provide intercountry adoption services.

The foreign-born child may be referred by international adoption agencies to the California adoption agency licensed to provide intercountry adoption services. Also, the foreign-born child may be a child personally known to the person(s) wishing to adopt him/her, or may be related to the person(s) wishing to adopt him/her.

The parent(s) who wants to adopt a foreign-born child must meet California's preadoption requirements. Once these have been met, the California adoption agency licensed to provide intercountry adoption services certifies that this information is correct to the Immigration and Naturalization Service (INS). This initiates the Federal process for the issuance of a visa for the child to enter the United States.

If the foreign-born child is to be adopted in California, the California adoption agency licensed to provide intercountry adoption services provides post-placement supervision until the adoption is finalized. If the child was adopted in his/her foreign country and the parent(s) wants to readopt the child in California, assistance is provided by the same adoption agency that provided the certification to INS that California's pre-adoption requirements have been met.

#### **Adoption Agencies**

Adoption agencies are either public entities or private, non-profit organizations. CDSS licenses both public and private agencies. Although there are no legal differences in the roles of public and private adoption agencies, there are significant and increasing differences between the children served by these agencies.

#### Public Adoption Agencies:

Public agencies focus their efforts on children who require adoptive placement due to their birth parents' inability to care for them without continuing to abuse and/or neglect them; without adoption, these children would remain in long-term foster care.

The public adoption agencies consist of licensed counties and seven CDSS district offices. Of the 58 counties in California, 28 are licensed to provide agency adoption services. In the 1998-99 State Fiscal Year, three counties provided services to neighboring counties. The remaining 27 counties are provided agency adoption services by five of the CDSS District Offices.

Licensed public adoption agencies are operated by the following 28 California counties:

CDSS provides agency and independent adoption services through district offices located in Chico, Eureka, Fresno, Rohnert Park, and Sacramento. The Monterey Park (located in Los Angeles county) and Oakland district offices provide only independent adoption services to assigned counties.

Chico district office provides agency and independent adoption services for Butte, Colusa, Glenn, Lassen, Modoc, Plumas, Sierra, Siskiyou, and Tehema counties and independent adoption services only for Shasta County.

Eureka district office provides agency and independent adoption services for Del Norte, Humboldt, and Trinity counties.

Fresno district office provides agency adoption services for Madera, Mariposa, Mono, and San Benito counties, and independent adoption services for Fresno, Inyo, Kern, Kings, Madera, Mariposa, Merced, Mono, San Benito, San Luis Obispo, and Tulare counties.

<sup>\*\*</sup> El Dorado County provides agency adoption services for Alpine County.

<sup>\*\*\*</sup> Kern County provides agency adoption services for Inyo County.

<sup>\*\*\*\*</sup> Tulare County provided agency adoption services for Kings County during the 1998-99 state Fiscal Year.

Rohnert Park district office provides agency and independent adoption services for Lake, Mendocino, Napa, and Sonoma counties.

Sacramento district office provides agency adoption services for Amador, Calaveras, Nevada, Sutter, Tuolumne, Yolo, and Yuba counties, and independent adoption services for Alpine, Amador, Calaveras, El Dorado, Nevada, Sacramento, Sutter, Tuolumne, Yolo, and Yuba counties.

Monterey Park district office provides independent adoption services only for Imperial, Orange, Riverside, San Bernardino, Santa Barbara, and Ventura counties.

Oakland district office provides independent adoption services only for Contra Costa, Marin, Monterey, San Francisco, San Joaquin, San Mateo, Santa Clara, Santa Cruz, Solano, and Stanislaus counties.

#### **Private Adoption Agencies:**

Private adoption agencies are non-profit charitable organizations. There were 55 licensed private agencies statewide during the 1998-99 state fiscal year (the number of private agencies may vary each fiscal year.) Private agencies tend to place healthy newborns voluntarily relinquished by their birth parents. Licensed private adoption agencies during the 1998-99 State Fiscal Year:

Parts A, B, C and D of the report include data about children served by adoption agencies. Part E includes data about persons who wish to adopt. Part F captures miscellaneous data.

All public and private adoption agencies who provide domestic adoption services shall complete and submit this report. (Agencies also licensed to provide intercountry adoption services shall also complete the Intercountry Adoption Program - Quarterly Statistical Report (AD 202B)). Send the completed report by the 20th calendar day of the month following the report quarter to:

#### **INSTRUCTIONS:**

Agency: Enter the agency's full name as it appears on the State license.

Code: Enter the agency's code number assigned by the CDSS Adoption Branch.

**Report for Quarter Ending:** Enter the last month of the reporting quarter and the four digit calendar year for the same month. The four reporting quarters are January through March, April through June, July through September, and October through December.

- PART A. Children Under Study But Not Free For Adoption. Provides data on children who have been accepted for study by the adoption agency but are not free for adoption. Do not include children who are in the custody of another adoption agency but who may be placed cooperatively in a home approved by the reporting agency.
  - 1. Under study, not free, end of prior quarter: This should be the same as Item 5 for the prior quarter.
  - 2. Accepted for study during the quarter: A child is "accepted for study" when either: (1) a court orders the public adoption agency to prepare a report for a hearing to be held pursuant to Welfare and Institutions Code, Section 366.26 or (2) the public or private adoption agency agrees to work with a parent(s) who expresses a serious interest in relinquishing the child for adoption.
  - Freed for adoptive placement during the quarter: A child is to be considered free for adoptive placement when an Acknowledgment and Confirmation of Receipt of Relinquishment Documents (AD 4333) is issued by the Adoptions Branch of CDSS.
    - There is one exception to this rule: A child who has been relinquished by his or her mother <u>and</u> any presumed father may be placed for adoption before the rights of an alleged father have been terminated as allowed by 22 CCR 35199(b)(1). In such cases, the child is to be reported on the Agency Adoption Program Quarterly Statistical Report (AD 56A) as freed for adoption during the quarter when the child is placed for adoption, not the quarter when the acknowledgment is issued. Such children are not free for adoption until the rights of the alleged father have been terminated by the court.
  - 4. Services terminated for other reasons during the quarter (e.g., miscarriage, abortion, a birth parent's decision to keep the child, a birth parent's decision to place the child for an independent adoption, or a court's decision at a Welfare and Institution Code, Section 366.26 hearing to not terminate parental rights).
  - 5. Under study, not free, end of quarter: This is the sum of Items 1 and 2 minus Items 3 and 4. It should equal a count of the cases of children who are under study but not free at the end of the quarter.

Children counted in Item 5 are divided into two groups:

- a. Placement identified: This is a count of the children reported in Item 5 for whom the agency knows the identity of the home where the child will be placed for adoption. Examples include children who are expected to be adopted by their foster parents and children who are, or will be, the subject of an identified relinquishment.
- b. Placement not identified: This is a count of the children reported in Item 5 for whom the agency has not identified an adoptive placement. The age and ethnicity of these children are reported on Table 1.

### PART A. Children Under Study - But Not Free For Adoption (Continued).

- Table 1. Detail for Item 5.b. categorize the children in 5.b. according to age and ethnicity. This information used to recruit adoptive families.
  - c. White: Indicate which children who are of Caucasian and/or Anglo-Saxon nationality into the four different age groups of 0-2 years, 3-5 years, 6-10 years, 11 years or older and then total for this nationality.
  - d. Black: Indicate which children who are of African-American nationality into the four different age groups of 0-2 years, 3-5 years, 6-10 years, 11 years or older and then total for this nationality.
  - e. Hispanic: Indicate which children who are of Latino and/or Mexican nationality into the four different age groups of 0-2 years, 3-5 years, 6-10 years, 11 years or older and then total for this nationality.
  - f. Mixed: Indicate which children who are of two or more nationalities into the four different age groups of 0-2 years, 3-5 years, 6-10 years, 11 years or older and then total for this nationality.
  - g. Other: Indicate which children who are of one nationality not of white, black, Hispanic nor mixed into the four different age groups of 0-2 years, 3-5 years, 6-10 years, 11 years or older and then total for this nationality.
  - h. Total: Indicate the total of the four different age groups of 0-2 years, 3-5 years, 6-10 years, 11 years or older and the total of the last total column which should match Item 5.b.
- 6. Welfare and Institutions Code, Section 366.26 reports completed: This is the number of such reports completed by public adoptions agencies during the quarter.
- PART B. Children Under Study Free But Not Placed. Provides data on children in the custody of the reporting adoption agency who have been freed for adoption, but who have not been placed for adoption. Do not include children who are in the custody of another adoption agency but who may be placed cooperatively in a home approved by the reporting agency.
  - 1. Free, not placed, end of prior quarter: This should be the same as Part B, Item 6 for the prior quarter.

Items 2 through 6 provide separate columns for children who are court dependents and children who are not court dependents.

- 2. Freed for adoptive placement during the quarter: This is the same as Part A, Item 3.
- 3. Removed from adoptive placement during the quarter: Report children who were actually or technically removed from adoptive placements during the quarter. Technical removals are where the child remains in the home, but with a different status (e.g., foster care or guardianship), or where the original adoptive placement agreement is replaced by a new agreement, usually because of divorce or marriage of the prospective adoptive parents.
- 4. Adoptive placement agreements completed during the quarter: Report children in the agency's custody for whom a formal adoptive placement agreement was signed by the adoption agency and the prospective adoptive parent(s) during the quarter. Do not count a "fost-adopt" placement until the child is placed for adoption; that is, until an adoptive placement agreement has been signed.
- Services terminated: Report children for whom services were terminated (e.g., due to death, becoming adult, relinquishment is rescinded, or a court termination of parental rights is overturned on appeal) during the quarter.
- 6. Free, not placed, end of quarter: This is the sum of Items 1, 2 and 3 minus Items 4 and 5. It should equal a count of children who are free for adoptive placement, but not placed for adoption at the end of the quarter. Note: Once a child is free for adoption, the child remains the responsibility of the adoption agency until the adoption is finalized, the child dies, the child becomes an adult or is otherwise emancipated, or the freeing action is reversed. Thus, children who have been freed, but not placed for adoption, are counted in this item even though day to day case management is the responsibility of a general child welfare caseload.

### PART B. Children Under Study - Free But Not Placed (Continued).

Children reported in Item 6 are divided into two groups:

- a. Case Plan goal is adoption: Children who the agency expects to place for adoption. This count is further divided into two groups:
  - (1) Placement identified: This is a count of the children reported in Item 6.a.(2). for whom the agency knows the identity of the home where the child will be placed for adoption (e.g., children who are expected to be adopted by their foster parents and children who are the subject of an identified relinquishment).
  - (2) Placement not identified: This is a count of the children reported in Item 6.a.(2). for whom the agency has not identified an adoptive placement. The age and ethnicity of these children are reported on Table 2.
- Table 2. Detail for Item 6.a.(2). categorize the children in 6.a. according to age and ethnicity. This information is used to recruit adoptive families.
  - c. White: Indicate which children who are of Caucasian and/or Anglo-Saxon nationality into the four different age groups of 0-2 years, 3-5 years, 6-10 years, 11 years or older and then total for this nationality.
  - d. Black: Indicate which children who are of African-American nationality into the four different age groups of 0-2 years, 3-5 years, 6-10 years, 11 years or older and then total for this nationality.
  - e. Hispanic: Indicate which children who are of Latino and/or Mexican nationality into the four different age groups of 0-2 years, 3-5 years, 6-10 years, 11 years or older and then total for this nationality.
  - f. Mixed: Indicate which children who are of two or more nationalities into the four different age groups of 0-2 years, 3-5 years, 6-10 years, 11 years or older and then total for this nationality.
  - g. Other: Indicate which children who are of one nationality not of white, black, Hispanic nor mixed into the four different age groups of 0-2 years, 3-5 years, 6-10 years, 11 years or older and then total for this nationality.
  - h. Total: Indicate the total of the four different age groups of 0-2 years, 3-5 years, 6-10 years, 11 years or older and the total of the last total column which should match Item 6.a.(2).
- b. Case Plan goal is not adoption: Children the agency does not expect to place for adoption. This count is further divided into two groups:
  - (1) Children in long-term foster care: Report those children who are not living with a legal guardian.
  - (2) Children living with legal guardian: Report those children who are living with a legal guardian.

- Part C. Children in Unfinalized Adoptive Placement. Provides data on children in the custody of the reporting adoption agency who have been placed for adoption, but whose adoptions have not been finalized. Do not include children who are in the custody of another adoption agency who have been placed cooperatively in a home approved by the reporting agency.
  - 1. In adoptive placement, end of prior quarter: This should be the same as Part C, Item 6 for the prior quarter.
  - 2. Adoptive placement agreements completed during the quarter: This is the same as Part B, Item 4.
  - 3. Removed from adoptive placement during quarter: This is the same as Part B, Item 3.
  - Services terminated: Report the number of service terminations (e.g., due to death, becoming an adult, relinquishment is rescinded, or a court termination of parental rights is overturned on appeal) during the quarter.

Items 5 and 6 provide separate columns for children who are court dependents and children who are not court dependents.

- 5. Adoptions finalized during quarter: Report the number of children for whom the court has granted an adoption decree.
- 6. In adoptive placement, end of quarter: This is the sum of Items 1 and 2 minus Items 3, 4 and 5. It should equal a count of the cases of children who are placed for adoption whose adoptions have not been completed at the end of the quarter.
- Part D. Children in Cooperative Placements. Provides information about children in the custody of the reporting agency who were placed in homes approved by other agencies and about children who other agencies have placed in homes approved by the reporting agency.
  - 1. This agency's children placed with families studied by other agencies during the quarter:

Adoptive Placement Agreements Completed during the quarter: Report the number of children in the custody of the reporting agency who were placed for adoption in homes approved by other agencies. This is a subset of the children reported in Part B, Item 4. Attach a list showing the child's name and the name of the adopting family's agency.

Adoptions Completed during the quarter: Report the number of completed adoptions of children in the custody of the reporting agency who were adopted by families approved by other agencies. This is a subset of the children reported in Part C, Item 5. Attach a list showing the child's name and the name of the adopting family's agency.

2. Other agencies' children placed with this agency's families during the quarter: Note: Children reported in Part D, Item 2 are not reported in Parts A, B or C.

Adoptive Placement Agreements Completed during the quarter: Report the number of children in the custody of another agency placed for adoption in homes approved by the reporting agency . Attach a list showing the child's name and the name of the adopting family's agency.

Adoptions Completed during the quarter: Report the number of completed adoptions of children in the custody of another agency placed for adoption in homes approved by the reporting agency. Attach a list showing the child's name and the name of the adopting family's agency.

## Part E. This Agency's Families. Provides data on families who have been approved as adoptive families or have expressed interest in adoption.

#### 1. Approved families

- a. Approved families available, end of prior quarter: This should be the same as Part E, Item 1.f. from the prior quarter.
- b. Families approved during quarter: Report all families for whom the agency approved the application for the adoptive placement of a child. This includes families approved as both foster families and as adoptive families. It does not include families approved only as foster families.
- c. Families who became available this quarter because placement terminated.
- d. Families with whom adoptive placements were made during the quarter: Report only those families who became unavailable for another adoptive placement because a child was placed in the only or last vacancy.
- e. Families otherwise disposed of during the quarter: Report families who become unavailable for an adoptive placement for other reasons such as a decision to not adopt or a decision to adopt independently.
- f. Approved families available, end of quarter: This is the sum of Items 1.a., 1.b., and 1.c., minus Items 1.d. and 1.e.. It should equal a count of the families who are available to accept a formal adoptive placement at the end of the quarter. These families are divided into two groups:
  - (1) Families not available for placement because they intend to adopt a foster child in their care: Thus, they are not available to accept the placement of a child for whom a home has not been identified (e.g., a child included on Table 1 in Part A or Table 2 in Part B).
  - (2) Families available for placement: These are families for whom a child has not yet been identified. In order to determine the availability of adoptive families, these families are divided into two groups:
    - (a) Families who will only accept healthy infants.
    - (b) Families who will accept other children (healthy or otherwise).

#### 2. Other activities

- a. Requests for applications received from families during the quarter.
- b. Applications denied, withdrawn or otherwise not approved during the quarter.

#### Part F. Other Adoption Activity. Provides miscellaneous data.

- 1. Post Finalization Services (All Agencies): This item includes services provided to adoptees, birth parents and/or adoptive parents after the adoption was finalized.
  - a. Provision of background information during the quarter: Report the number of cases where the agency provided adoptees, adoptive parents or birth parents with requested non-identifying background information.
  - b. AAC/AAP recertification/grant modification during the quarter: Report the number of completed Adoption Assistance Agreement amendments.
  - c. Other post-finalization services completed during the quarter: Report all other post-finalization services such as counseling and arranging for contact between members of the adoption triad.
- 2. Additional Activities Public Agencies Only: This data is collected from public (County and CDSS) adoption agencies for use in determining the allocation of funding (the "adoptions yardstick").
  - a. Completed services to other agencies during the quarter:
    - (1) One time requests: This includes activities such as accepting a relinquishment and obtaining background information from a birth parent on behalf of another agency.
    - (2) Post-placement supervision (do not include cooperative placement activities): These are cases where the child is <u>not</u> the responsibility of the reporting agency and the adoptive family was <u>not</u> studied/approved by the reporting agency; usually cases where the family has moved to an area served by the reporting agency after the family assessment was completed.
  - b. Foster care cases reviewed and not recommended for adoption during the quarter: Report those cases where the report prepared by the agency for a Welfare and Institution Code, Section 366.26 hearing recommended that the child not be adopted.
  - c. Requests for adoptive placement not accepted for study (children) during the quarter: Report those cases where, after discussion with the birth parent or the referring agency (usually child welfare services), the agency decided to not accept the child for study.
